### **Course Highlights:**

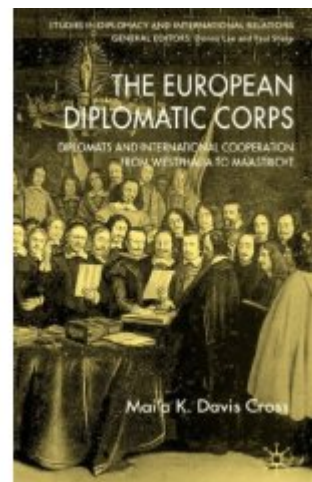
